The exhibition will provide a contemporary interpretation of light-infused phenomena from the illumination of Newgrange at the winter solstice to the Whirlpool galaxy, water crystals and fractal designs. Imagine Ireland, Culture Ireland's year-long celebration of Irish arts in the United States, continues throughout the autumn and winter. Dragana Jurisic, whose work featured in the summer 2011 edition of the Irish Arts Review, was also awarded The Curtin O'Donoghue Emerging Photographic Artist Award at the RHA's 181st Annual Exhibition this year. In September, she will present 'FYI Yugoslavia: in the footsteps of Rebecca West', a work in progress at the The Fifth Biennial Rebecca



West Conference in Baruch College, New York (16–17 September). 'There proceeds steadily from that place a stream of events which are a source of danger to me,' wrote the Irish-born writer Rebecca West in 1937 before embarking on a journey through Yugoslavia. The result was Black Lamb and Grey Falcon, a history and travelogue of Yugoslavia. West was a suffragette and socialist, journalist, political analyst and novelist. In 2011 Dragana Jurisic started retracing West's journey through Yugoslavia. Mark Clare, a Fine Art graduate from the University of Ulster will launch Epic, a solo exhibition of new work consisting of photography, sculpture, video and a large site-specific work developed for the grounds of LaGrange Art Museum in
